**II. Course Description:** An intermediate drawing course in which students will use gesture & contour techniques to develop their figure-drawing skills. Emphasis placed on originality & imagination.

III. Suggested Readings (optional): both are in the library and Dr. Smith's collection

IV. Materials: (Same as Draw I) Hobby Lobby (on-line coupon), Wal-Mart, Office Depot

1 Drawing Pad 18 x 24" (not newsprint - not sketch pad) 80 lb. paper is good

2 erasers - 1 kneaded and 1 vinyl or plastic

Charcoal pencil medium soft

Graphite pencils - 8B (ebony is 2<sup>nd</sup> best in place of 8B), 6B, 4B, and 2B

Choose 1 of the following: Soft, Hard, or oil pastel; if pastels bought in bulk, you may share costs and supplies Choose 1 of the following: Colored Pencils (Crayola, Prismacolor, & Ticonderoga), gel pens, or color markers Container for your supplies (zipper pocket or Zip Lock bag)

**Draw II Supplies all optional:** Brush (cheap one, bamboo if you have it, to use with ink) Non-traditional tools i.e. Q-tip, matchstick, popsicle stick, pipe cleaner, twig, toothpick, sponge, etc. Black markers: small and medium nib, India or Script ink (small bottle) optional

- V. Course Objectives: The student will be introduced to:
  - 1. gesture and contour drawing while studying the human figure.
  - 2. muscles and the skeleton by drawing the human figure.
  - 3. unique drawing techniques by using non-traditional drawing tools.
  - 4. facial muscles and the skull by creating an **expressive** portrait.
  - 5. creativity by designing pattern, simplification, humor, surrealism, or abstract drawing.
- VI. Method of Evaluation: The student's grade includes their work ethic, attendance, and attitude. Drawings will be graded on expressiveness of the elements of art, how well the medium is used, how well instructions are followed, how well deadlines are met, and neatness. The purchase of a drawing pad smaller than 18 x 24" will result in lower grades for each smaller project. Any behavior or project deemed inappropriate by Dr. Smith results in an F for the project and possibly the course.
- VII. Attendance, Make-up Work and Disability Policies:
  - 1. Attendance is mandatory. Three tardies (or leaving class early) will count as 1 absence. Continued absences will result in the final grade dropped by 1 letter. Excessive absences will result in failure of the course. A grade of "FA" is assigned for any student who ceases to attend a course, or has been absent the *equivalent* of, three continuous weeks. For example, a class meeting one day a week, a student would be assigned an "FA" after missing three classes. Excused absences (a pre-arranged excused absence or Doctor's note turned in during the next class) might be given special consideration. Please wait 20 minutes if Dr. Smith is late.
  - 2. It is the student's responsibility to turn in make-up work to the professor. You will only be reminded to display your assignments 2 times, after which you will have a zero for the assignment.
